The battle pitted the forces of Henry VI – king since 1422, but a weak ruler whose last fifteen years had seen a catalogue of foreign and domestic disasters – against Edward IV, proclaimed king.

Henry VI His childhood was overshadowed by the Wars of the Roses - the white rose of York against the red rose of Lancaster.
